A community of practice can work in a variety of ways, but an effective CoP will always engage participants in developing their own thinking alongside those with a shared interest. We want to encourage those working on Family Hub development in the South East to build knowledge; share best practice; explore the evidence base behind established programmes to support families; and promote innovative ideas that could start to make a difference. We will start with a morning workshop but hope our CoPs will continue to communicate regularly over the coming months.

Family Hub blog:

Do you have something on your mind about Family Hubs? Are you playing with ideas in your head about how to improve services for families in your area? Do you have a burning issue that might challenge other people's thinking? We would really like to encourage you to contribute a short blog of between 100-300 words that might help to shape our thinking about Family Hubs and how to implement them in the South East. We were delighted to receive feedback about the blog in the last newsletter, thank you to those who took the time to let us know. We were so pleased to hear that the first blog 'concept or concrete' sparked some reflections...

"I thought the person who wrote the blog in the newsletter was spot on, it is exactly the conversations we are having as an LA. We do not want the buildings to be spaces from where services deliver their work and then still signpost families back to Children/Family Centre staff, which is what often happened previously. I believe that integration across the partners is absolutely key - big culture changes are required to make this happen".

NCFH SEND update:

The National Centre for Family Hubs are currently in the process of writing a new module for the family hub implementation toolkit relating to special educational needs and disabilities (SEND). The module will support local authorities and their stakeholders to keep the needs of families, who have one or more children with SEND, at the heart of their planning and development of Family Hubs. The module is being written in co-production with parents, carers and young people with expertise from experience and those who have expertise by profession, from education and health. The draft module will also be shared with a wider range of people and

professions from across the country before it is ready to be launched at the webinar on 29th March – just follow the <u>link</u>.
