• <u>AD Education Network meeting today:</u> attached are the Portsmouth lead member's briefing about the implications of new attendance guidance and key points from the CME Group about the guidance; information from the SESLIP High Needs Budgets Forum about the project on independent SEND placements.

In Today's Update:

- 1. <u>DfE</u>: Revised Schools Causing Concern guidance, report based on March survey schools, LA place planning scorecard, updated Virtual School Guidance, EET stats for 16-18 year olds, post-16 choices consultation.
- 2. <u>National reports</u>: KS2 pupils catching-up but KS1 still lag behind pre-pandemic pupils, Gatsby Foundation launches a guide to the education system for employers.
- 3. <u>Research</u>: Early years inequalities in the UK have changed little over the past 20 years, articles on evidence into practice.
- 4. <u>News:</u> Young men's involvement in work is falling, CAMHS failings linked to girl's suicide, DfE 'pauses' key parts of the Schools Bill and to review elements dealing with MAT regulation, campaign for free covid tests in schools, tough year with out-of-touch DfE ASCL end of year review, DfE disputes with LAs about high needs funds.

1. DfE:

- Schools Causing Concern guidance has been updated following consultation and will be for implementation from September. <u>https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/schools-causingconcern--2</u>
- Report of the regular panel survey of teachers and school leaders, from March 2022. Themes addressed, in additional to behaviour and staff health, include swimming provision and delivery of remote learning.

2. National reports:

• Analysis from RS Assessments finds whilst there has been considerable catch up at KS2, there is still some lag in test scores for writing, punctuation and spelling. However, at KS1, assessments suggest

3. Research:

- Longitudinal research into the early years in England demonstrates that inequalities in cognition and social / emotional development have changed little over the past 20 years, despite unprecedented investment. However, disconnected policies across housing (benefits cap), benefits (two child limit) and SureStart reductions do not help. - Looking beneath the surface of data showing more 18-24 year olds are economically active shows mixed themes.
